



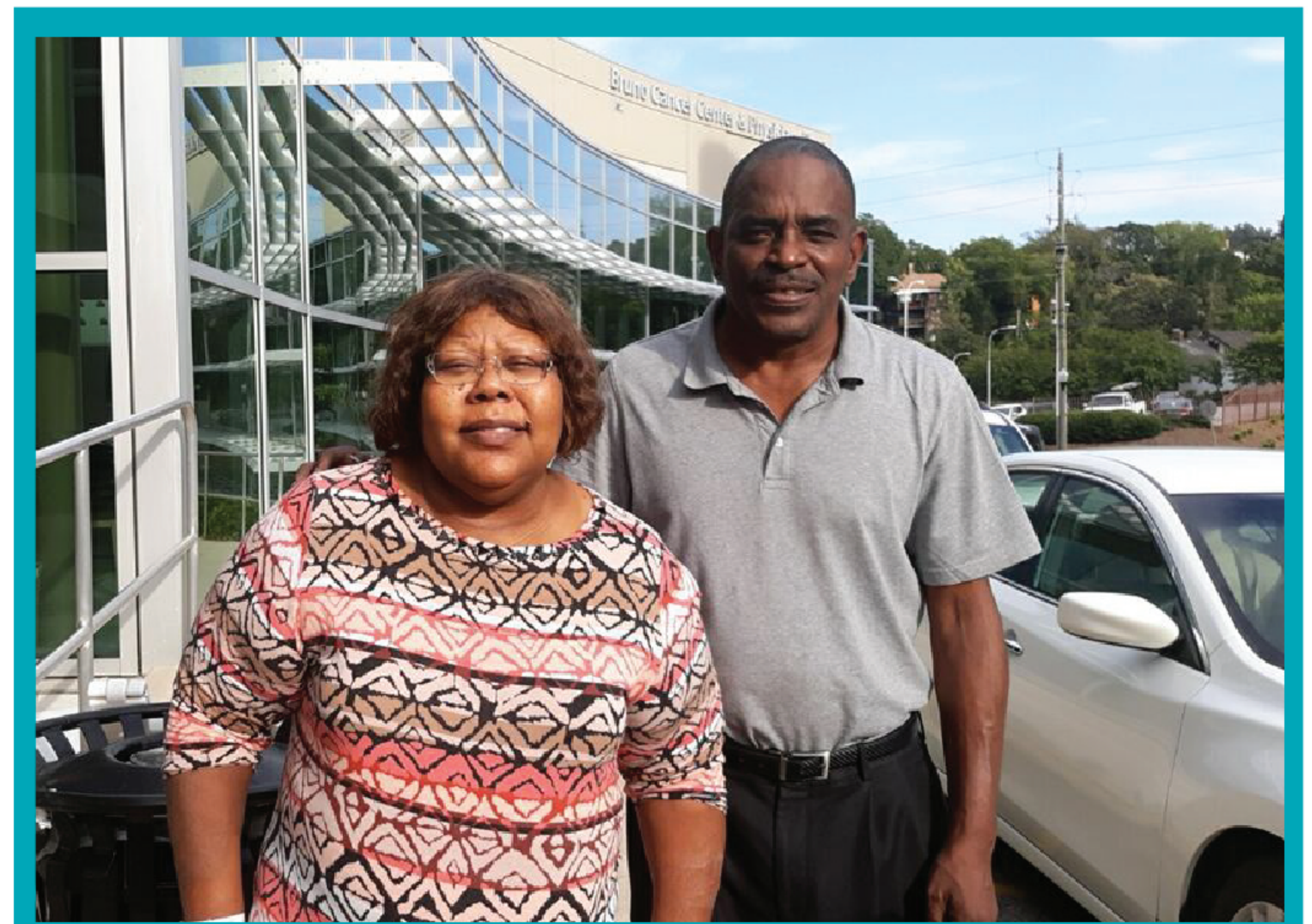
SURVIVOR STORY

I was first diagnosed in 2012. I remember the doctor saying "ovarian cancer," and then telling me about prognosis and time frames.

This summer I had my second recurrence, and started chemo again.

I'm retired, so I'm on a set income, and through seven years of fighting cancer, I've already completely wiped out my savings. I was substitute teaching, but I can't do that while I'm going through treatment. Trying to get transportation was difficult – you might have somebody that can get you there once or twice, but it's not reliable, because people have their own lives.
